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2011 NEW JERSEY YOUTH OF THE YEAR

For the second straight year, The Boys & Girls Club in Atlantic City has produced the New Jersey State Youth of the Year. Frankie Watson, an 18-year old member of the Boys & Girls Club of Atlantic City, New Jersey since the age of 11, has been named the New Jersey Youth of the Year by Boys & Girls Clubs of America (BGCA). Frankie was selected from a pool of 19 finalists representing more than 100,000 Club participants statewide. As the New Jersey Youth of the Year, Frankie will receive a \$20,000 scholarship from Walmart, the New Jersey Youth of the Year Event Sponsor.

The Youth of the Year program, which is administered by Boys & Girls Clubs of America (BGCA) recognizes outstanding effort and contributions by club members between the ages of 14 and 18, to their family, school, community and Boys & Girls Club, as well as having overcome personal challenges and obstacles.

In July, Frankie will go on to compete against other state winners in BGCA's Northeast Region in New York City. If named regional

winner, she will be awarded a \$10,000 college scholarship and advance to the national competition in Washington DC. The National Youth of the Year additional \$50,000 college scholarship and will be

installed by President Barack Obama in an oval office ceremony.

Frankie is a senior at Atlantic City High School where she is an honor roll student. She has dedicated herself to her studies and community. She recently participated in the Miniuniversity Program at Richard Stockton College and earned a certificate in recognition of her achievement. Frankie has been a club member for over 7 years and has participated in many activities. She has been actively involved in the Champions of Youth Program. Through the Champion of Youth Frankie has participated in various fundraising efforts, leadership seminars and numerous historical and cultural activities. Her standout leadership as a Boys & Girls Club member is an inspiration to all those whom she encounters, proving once again that if not what one is given but what one gives back that really makes a difference.

GOVERNOR SIGNS BILL WHICH BOOSTS SUPPORT OF BOYS & GIRLS CLUBS

On April 27th, 2011 legislation sponsored by Assembly members Annette Quijano, Ruben J. Ramos, Jr., and Upendra J. Chivukula to create a new fund to benefit the Boys and Girls Clubs in New Jersey through voluntary contributions on the state's corporate and personal income tax returns was signed into law by Governor Christie.

"The Boys and Girls Clubs provide a safe, educational environment for disadvantaged youth in the otherwise unsupervised hours before and after school," said Quijano (D-Union). "This is a simple way to boost support for their efforts." The new law (formerly A-3267) establishes the "Boys and Girls Club in New Jersey Fund." Under the law, taxpayers will have the option to contribute to this new fund through a check-off box on New Jersey's corporate and personal income tax returns each year.

"Giving these kids a viable alternative to drug and gang violence is a worthy cause that deserved an easy option to support," said Ramos (D-Hudson).

"Boys and Girls Clubs are a tremendous asset to our communities and it benefits us all to help increase support for their endeavors," said Chivukula (D-Middlesex/ Somerset).

On a snowy January 8th, the Trenton Club hosted our third annual Youth-of-the-Year Ambassador's Training. This annual training is geared to train a team of young "Ambassadors", comprised of club members who were previously Youth-of-the-Year winners and finalists, to speak on behalf of the BGCNJ and their own respective clubs, to the media, at club events and various other speaking engagements. These young people represent the "best and brightest" from clubs throughout New Jersey — they are the "caring, responsible citizens" the Boys & Girls Clubs are committed to producing. The training has two parts – Personal Branding and Media Training. Personal Branding, which was conducted by Kim Lewis-Collins, a member of the BGCNJ Marketing Advisory Board, gives the "Ambassadors" some basic training on the concepts of brand marketing, how to define their own "personal brand" and how all the things they do, wear and say contribute to how others perceive them, and the BGCNJ. Media Training, conducted by Jennifer Kramer a member of the BGCNJ Marketing Advisory Board and Brian Thompson, WNBC Reporter, allowed the "Ambassadors" to hear what a professional reporter had

to say about interview answers, how to answer questions correctly just as they would in a real TVinterview, paying attention to posture and diction, and answering a question while including key messaging on behalf of BGCNJ.

LOCAL CLUB PROFILE — NORTHWEST NEW JERSEY

The The Boys & Girls Club of Northwest New Jersey, formerly known as the Boys & Girls Club of Wayne, was founded in 1972. The Club currently serves over 5000 youth in three full service clubhouses located in Wayne, Pequannock and Haledon. The organization has a Board of Directors consisting of twenty-four volunteers, a full time staff of twenty professionals, a part time staff of over 100 college and high school students as well as over 300 volunteers. The organiza-

tion operates on a budget of just over 3.2 million dollars.

The Wayne site operates in a facility of 36,000 square feet and serves 3300 children ages 2.5 – 18. Under the direction

of Unit Director Dave Font, the club's programming focuses on creating healthy lifestyles, promoting academic success and building good character and citizenship. Specific program areas used to achieve these results include Recreation and Traveling Sports, Afterschool programming, Kindergarten Enrichment, Early Childhood Development and Keystone/Torch clubs. The club completed a 6200 sq. ft. addition in 2009 which serves as its early childhood center with a current enrollment of 55 children ages 2.5-5.

The Pequannock Unit, formerly the Boys & Girls Club of Morris County currently serves over 1300 members ages 3-18. The unit officially became part of the Boys & Girls Clubs of Northwest New Jersey in October of 2006. Under the direction of Unit Director Danielle Altman, many club programs are operating at or near capacity. According to Chief Volunteer Officer Rudy Favocci, the expansion and renovation of the Pequannock facility is a top priority of the Board as we set our sights to the future.

The Haledon Unit was opened in July 2009 after the organization negotiated a contract for services with the Borough

of Haledon. Mayor Dominick Stampone was instrumental in bringing Club services to the Borough. Operating out of the former Haledon PAL, the Club serves over 500 children from Haledon and Prospect Park under the direction of Kris Kelly. Chief Professional Officer Joseph Lynch had indicated a steady rise in membership each year as the community becomes more aware of our services.

Even though only a small handful actually receive the opportunity, I think all of the kids can strive towards being a part of it. This gives them another reason to be better and drive themselves towards their goals.
