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BGCNJ LAUNCHES ASTHMA AWARENESS PROGRAM



Boys & Girls Clubs in New Jersey (BGCNJ) is excited to announce launch of the the Breathe Easier with Asthma Management (BEAM) program which funded by The Horizon Foundation for New Jersey (The

Foundation). The Foundation has invested \$500,000 in this pilot initiative, which will raise awareness about asthma and educate Boys & Girls Club members and their parents or caregivers about asthma and how to most effectively manage it. A component of the program will be to work with youth diagnosed with asthma to improve their overall health and quality of life.

In 2009, one in seven NJ children under age 18 had suffered from asthma at some point in life, and one in 11 currently had asthma.

The BEAM pilot program will target nine counties in New Jersey where there are high rates of childhood asthma. BEAM will serve 2,500 children ages 5-18 at twelve Boys & Girls Clubs from September 2014 through June 2015. During this pilot implementation, the program is being delivered at the Boys & Girls Clubs of Camden County, Clifton, Gloucester, Hudson County, Hawthorne, Mercer Army/Ironbound-Newark, County, Salvation Northwest NJ, Paterson/Passaic County, Perth Amboy, Union County, and Vineland.

BGCNJ has partnered with the American Lung Association (ALA) to use their *Open Airways for Schools* curriculum for youth with asthma. Additionally, ALA has developed the *Asthma Awareness* program especially for non-asthmatic youth. ALA provided training to Club staff on delivery of these two components and will serve as a resource throughout the program.



The BEAM program kicked off in September with parent information nights that gave parents an overview of the program goals and allow each participating youth to be screened for asthma. Any youth deemed to be at high risk for asthma will receive referrals to doctors in their community.

The program seeks to provide early education to prevent future health issues, reduce the rate of emergency room usage and hospitalization rates. BGCNJ is proud to have been selected to collaborate with The Horizon Foundation for New Jersey on the BEAM Pilot Program to educate and build awareness of this disease in our Club communities and beyond.

NJ YOUTH OF THE YEAR COMPETES IN NATIONALS



Sparkle Prevard, 2014 New Jersey & Northeastern Regional Youth of the Year

After receiving the NJ State Youth of the Year title in June at the annual Gala of Champions, Sparkle Prevard went on to win the title of Northeast Regional Youth of the Year in August. Sparkle received a \$20,000 college scholarship from BGCNJ as the NJ State Youth of the Year and will receive an additional \$10,000 towards her education for her regional win. On September 16, Sparkle competed in the 2014 National Youth of the Year competition in Washington D.C.

Sparkle joined 5 other young women representing the national Boys & Girls Club movement in Washington for the Youth of the Year competition. Out of 4 million Club kids, these 6 young ladies

were chosen as finalists for National Youth of the Year, based on their commitment to service, their poise & their pursuit of success. Over the course of the weekend leading up to Tuesday's final decision, the finalists participated in media training to prepare them to be representatives of Clubs nationwide, did a photo shoot on Capital Hill, participated in a DC landmark scavenger hunt and met with judges for their interviews.

Sparkle began her journey to Youth of the Year seven years ago when she joined the Boys & Girls Club of Atlantic City during a difficult time in her life. Sparkle found a second family in her fellow Club members and the
